Letter from the Director



December 2024 Newsletter #134 Dear Esteemed Supporters,

As we approach the close of this year, we face the pressing reality that the goal of rendering shelters unnecessary remains elusive. Although the prospect may seem distant, we assure you that we continue to hold on to hope and remain steadfast in our mission. Our shelter is currently operating at full capacity, necessitating ongoing relocation of cats to provide newly admitted felines with an opportunity to acclimate.

We receive approximately 95 percent of our inquiries from individuals seeking to relinquish their cats. Regrettably, we must repeatedly decline such requests due to our limited resources. We recently saw an overabundance of cats being dumped at our facility. We have now placed cameras and can at least bring them in from inclement weather. While we are relieved that abandoned cats are not left in rural areas, this situation greatly strains our ability to feed, house, provide veterinary care, and medicate these animals to ensure their well-being. Shelter capacity is a concern and challenge for most shelters, including ours.

As Christmas approaches, we are grateful for the support, and we ask that the building fund is continually blessed so that we can begin in 2025. We are close, but every dime counts and is needed to be successful in Hans Fried's dream, when in his own words, he said: "To save a life is more in conformity with God's law than to kill!" That and the love and healing these furry creatures bring is why we will push through with hope and faith that we will not be needed one day.

We want to express our heartfelt gratitude for your unwavering support. Your generosity has made a significant difference in the lives of the cats we care for. Thank you for standing with us in our mission to make shelters unnecessary.

Since our last newsletter, two featured cats have found their forever homes. So have two of the ones shown with our crew pictures. I don't think we emphasized enough how much they love us, and

phasized enough how much they love us, and though they may be glad when we find our forever homes, they feel sad about losing us. Oh well, that's humans for you; we cats are not as emotional.

You have read about Yoda, our hip dysplasia cat, but not about his sidekick, Trinity. She is a three-year-old gray tiger, born at the shelter and the only survivor of five kittens. However, she ended up with cerebellar hypoplasia and could barely move without falling over. Even after she was transferred to the blind cat room with Yoda, it took her a long time to overcome her fear. But, once she came out of her shell, boy did she move! It took a few weeks until her legs got strong enough to carry her body and let her stand, walk, sit, and keep herself clean. Now, she moves up and down the hallway almost as fast as Yoda. But I really was shocked when she climbed halfway up the cat tree. I am glad her caretaker put cat beds around the bottom in case she falls.

Now, a story I just heard from one of our volunteers. It shows how two cats, a male (M) stray and a female (F) inside/outside cat, who are not even buddies, work together to communicate their wishes to a human (H). M first showed up during the mating season and was promptly rebuffed. Mating season was over, and he kept on coming back. Finally, H put out food and a carrier for him, and he made his headquarters at her house. F is kept inside after dinner. After they started to meow at each other at bedtime, H chased him until she noticed that F did not want to go out and understood that M was not asking for a date but for food. She put out the food, he ate and then went into his carrier. F stayed inside, and once she saw him eat, she went to her own bowls. The next morning, they said: "Let's see if the human got the message," and as soon as H got up, they started meowing again. H understood and put out breakfast. That shows what we cats can do.

From the Desk of Brittany

Hello everyone!

As the holiday season approaches, we find ourselves over capacity yet again. Daily, we receive multiple calls and voicemails from individuals who find themselves, or a family member, unable to care for their cats and want to surrender them to a shelter. While we wish to provide shelter and care for every feline that needs it, we do not have the space or funds to do so.

We have also had an uptick of cats being dumped on the premises. To name a few, we have had a kitten tossed onto the lawn, zipped up inside of an insulated lunch bag; multiple cats left in a small dog kennel; a litter of kittens in a milk crate; and most recently, a very sweet cat we have named Maya, who was left in a carrier by our door. At the same time, an obviously distressed child cried for her in the background. Luckily, we have cameras that catch this happening, so someone is able to get to the shelter quickly to get the cats safely indoors. We also get good views of the people doing this, so it can be turned over to the proper authorities.

This situation places an unbelievable amount of stress on us, as we are already full. We then have to make room somehow for the extra mouths to feed. It also places a lot of stress on these innocent cats, whose lives were just turned upside down. I want to stress this to the public: pets are a lifetime commitment. That cute little kitten will grow up. As they age, just like in humans, health problems can and do develop. You need to be prepared to care for them accordingly.

We understand that things happen, and every situation is different. We do what we can to help, but many surrenders are cats that have become unwanted due to health issues or the fact that they are no longer

that cute, playful little kitten. We encourage those considering surrendering their cats to explore all options before doing so. Contact friends or family who might be willing to take the cat in. Additionally, numerous resources are available for pet owners facing financial, behavioral, or health-related challenges.

We rely heavily on the generosity of the community to continue our mission. Donations, whether monetary or in-kind, go a long way in helping us provide food, medical care, and enrichment for all cats in our care. Ultimately, our goal is to find loving, permanent homes for all of the cats that we care for. We believe every cat deserves a chance at a happy, healthy life, and with your support, we strive to make that a reality. Thank you for understanding and supporting our efforts to protect and care for these wonderful animals.

- Studies suggest that domesticated cats first appeared around 3600 B.C.
- Two hundred feral cats prowl the park at Disneyland, doing their part to control rodents—the ones who don't wear funny outfits and speak in squeaky voices.

ABANDONING ANIMALS AT SHELTERS

When animals are abandoned at shelters after hours, the individuals don't realize the hardships the shelters and animals go through.

Besides scrambling and rearranging to find space at an overcrowded shelter, the poor animals don't even have the familiarity of their own names to help them adjust.

Consider the uncertainty and stress the shelters face when they don't even have any history on the animals. The animals now have to go through quarantine, vet checks, immunizations, and females anesthetized so they can be shaved to find out if they have a spay scar and possible surgery for spaying/neutering. Do these animals get along with other animals, or do they need single-household adoptions? Do they get along with kids? Do they bite? Why did the owners abandon their pets? Was it an issue with the animal, making it unadoptable, or was it for some other reason?

Also, weather plays a part. Are the animals being left outside in the cold, rain, or heat until someone from the shelter finds them the following day?

Please pass the word around that even though someone thinks they are doing a good thing by

leaving their pet at a shelter, even though it is after hours, instead of just abandoning them outside to fend for themselves, here are some sugges-tions to try first:

- 1. Consider future endeavors before even getting a pet. They are a lifelong (of the pet) commitment.
- 2. Ask your friends and family if they can take your pet(s) in.
- 3. Post them on social media to see if someone wants to adopt them.
- 4. Ask your vet if they would be willing to try to find a home for them with their clientele.
- 5. Go to nokillnetwork.org for a listing of all no-kill shelters in your area. Choose your state (and any nearby state), then select all the cities you would be willing to travel to.
- 6. Contact the shelters first, arrange to bring the animals in, and give shelter employees/volunteers the needed information.
- 7. After exhausting all avenues listed above, and someone has to resort to abandoning them after hours, please keep the shelter and pet in mind by leaving a substantial dona tion and history with the animal.

CATS/KITTENS AS GIFTS

Cats/kittens can be given as gifts, but not as suprise gifts. You might pick one that seems like the perfect feline companion but said feline might not like the person/family you are presenting it to. On the special gift-giving day, give a card with a coupon from you, sponsoring a feline adoption of your choice, and then let the intended recipient pick out a kitty that is perfect for them. Or, let the recipient pick out their kitty a few days ahead of time so the whole family (kitty included) can enjoy that special day together.
